**Wabi-sabi for Artists, Designers, Poets & Philosophers**, Leanard Koren. Don't be put off by the highfaluting title! If this one is not available, grab whatever is in the Library. **Wabi-sabi** is the Japanese life-value that prioritises the beauty of transience and imperfection, an essential outlook for those of us aware of our mounting imperfections!

**Death in Tokyo**, Keigo Higashino "On the **Nihonbashi Bridge in Tokyo** stands the statue of a mythic beast – a kirin. One evening a man staggers onto the bridge and collapses beneath the winged creature. The patrolman on watch goes to rouse the man, who he presumes to be drunk – only to discover that the man had been stabbed in the chest. He is dead."

**Claws of the Cat**, Susan Spann. **May 1564**: When a samurai is brutally murdered in a **Kyoto** teahouse, master ninja Hiro has no desire to get involved. But the beautiful entertainer accused of the crime enlists the help of Father Mateo, the Portuguese Jesuit Hiro is sworn to protect, leaving the master *shinobi* with just three days to find the killer in order to save the girl and the priest from execution.

**The Guest Cat**, Takashi Hirade. A cat begins to visit a young couple living in a quiet part of Tokyo and has an unexpected impact on their lives. This small book won a prestigious literary award in Japan and was a best seller in France and the US. Not just for cat lovers!

## A (VERY) Short History of Japan

**Feudal history – pre-1604** - Two centuries of provincial **Daimyo** (warlord) fighting – **Samurai** powerful – Warlords invade Korea – artisans abducted

Shintoism - Zen Buddhism - Confucianism - Christianity outlawed

**1604** – Daimyo **Tokugawa** seizes control and is granted a special title by the Emperor: **Shogunate**. His lands are in **EDO**, present day **TOKYO**. He keeps the peace, subjugates the other daimyo, **keeps them poor**, decommissions a lot of samurai. His descendants build a bridge in Edo (**Nihonbashi**) and the small fishing village quickly expands into the most populous city in the world. **The Emperor remains in Kyoto**, is visited by the Shogun who builds his own palace and gardens. The Edo Shogun insists other Daimyo travel to Edo every two years and build residences and gardens there. Decommissioned samurai move to Edo and bring with them their social status, cultural knowledge, e.g. tea ceremony practices, geisha parties, fashion, and slowly Imperial Court high culture begins to filter down the social classes: art, theatre, literature, education. As the city grows, wealthy merchants and small traders open shops in Nihonbashi and a strong mercantile economy is born. Edo becomes a hot house for the spread of a national culture, supervised by the Shogun. "Period of Isolation".

**1853 – Commodore Perry,** US armed steamers arrive and force Japan to "open up" to Western trade. Shogun's control is diluted, other Daimyo jostle for power.

**1868** – **Emperor Meiji** is reinstated by disgruntled daimyo and moves his court to **Tokyo**, and restoration of Imperial Palace and Gardens begins in Kyoto

**1905-1940s** – short period of internal party politics. Japan defeats Russia, invades China and annexes Korea. Signs pact with Hitler, invades China again – build up of military rule

**1940** – military takeover

1941 – surprise attack on Pearl Harbour

**1942** – Japan begins occupations of Indo-China, the Philippines, East Indies, Burma and Malaya, and advances into the Pacific Region.

1945 - Atomic Bombs - Constitutional Monarchy

1952 – Japan regains Independence but US remains in Okinawa.

1956 – Japan joins United Nations

**1964** – Tokyo Olympics

1982 – Honda opens its first plant in US

**1997** – economic recession

2011 - Fukushima earthquake and tsunami - nuclear plant meltdown

**2019 -** Emperor Akihito abdicates in favour of his son, Crown Prince Naruhito.

**2020** – Pandemic and Olympic Games

2024 - Small group of Australian Art & Cultural enthusiasts travel to Japan!
